

Wednesday 11th November 2020-Remembrance Day

This week we are learning all about Remembrance Day and doing lots of activities about it. Use the links in this sheet to take you to the British Royal Legion website where you will find the resources needed for this week.

On the above link you will find resources which explore the end of the Second World War and provide comparisons between the service and sacrifice of 1945 and of today, demonstrating the many similarities of feelings and emotions between then and now (linked to lockdown too).

Creative writing - Read the Creative writing Poetry PowerPoint. Explain to children that they are going to be thinking about children's experiences of the Second World War and then they will be ready to imagine they are an evacuee and write a poem about what home is to them.

Read the story extract from 'Tomorrow Today' by Leila Rasheed from the book Home again - stories about coming home from war - then read the evacuees fact file. There is also a nice reading comprehension linked to this extract too.

Home poetry After completing the activities on the PowerPoint children could write a poem about what home means to them.

Feelings then and now.

Look at the images (on the worksheet). What do you think the children in these pictures are feeling? Are they feeling the same or different? Draw a line from the thought bubble that describes a feeling to the picture you think it matches.



Missing Home

What would you miss if you had to leave home? Children to draw pictures of items they would take with them.

Circle time - if you had to leave home what would you most miss? Think of people, items, activities etc.





Learn about the famous artist Georgia O'Keeffe. She was fascinated with flowers, especially poppies. Use her style to create your own poppy painting. She is most famous for her 'Oriental Poppies' painting she created in 1928.



As Remembrance parades are cancelled this year perhaps children could paint a poppy on a pebble and take it to leave near a war memorial or church to remember those who fought for us.



Other ideas include;

- Making their own poppy display at home in their windows and sending in pictures to us.
- Raising money in different ways such as running for poppy week - My Poppy Run - Royal British Legion. Is free to enter and you can set your own target.
- Free Fundraising Pack on the Royal British Legion website for children or adults of any age to help raise money 11/11 challenge - make 11 knitted poppies for 11 friends. Make 11 cupcakes for 11 friends etc.




